




Literacy Knowledge Organiser Reception – Spring 2

What I am reading



What I will learn:

- To join in with repeated refrains.
- To consider my own choice of vocabulary for story writing
- To begin to story map and innovate a story
- To explore; the beginning, middle and end of a story
- To listen to and perform a range of poems and rhymes.
- To ascribe meaning to marks.
- To hear initial and last sounds in words.
- To segment and blend c-v-c words for writing.
- To attempt to write simple sentences that can be read by myself and others.
- Use wow words in my writing

Key Vocabulary


Handwriting	Writing should be able to be read by others. Know that there are small letters and tall letters.
Vocabulary	Vocabulary means the words that we know. We should try and learn as many words as we can, so that we can read and write clearly. We should be able to write some CVC and CCVC words correctly.
Names and labels	We should be able to write our name and some other familiar words e.g. mum, dad, siblings names etc. We can also spell familiar placed, animals and objects with accuracy e.g. shop, car, dog, duck.
Simple sentences	We should start to say our sentence and then write a sentence that has real meaning, and can be read by others.
Innovate	To change a familiar story using my own ideas. For example: <i>The Very Hungry Caterpillar ate / apple</i> could now be <i>The Starving Elephant ate / banana</i> .






- Share stories with your child and develop a love of reading; talk about the text, the characters and setting.
- Build up your children's vocabulary by sharing new experiences with them talking to them regularly about what they can see.
- The world around you – talk about what is around you. Talk about different events during this time of year, fireworks, Diwali, Christmas.
- Go out on walks and explore the natural environment notice the changes outside.
- Encourage your children to write simple words using their phonetical knowledge.
- Review the letter formation chart to support handwriting development.
